SCHEDULING & LOGISTICS

Squad Time

We are Better Together and value the time we can spend developing relationships with each other. You will begin each school day with your squad (a group of middle school students) and your squad teacher for devotions, discussion, games and other activities. This teacher will be your point of contact for general questions, and is the teacher your parents will meet with for parent-teacher conferences.

Chapel

You will attend chapel on Wednesday mornings with the high school students. Chapel services are intended to be a joyful Christian experience. Students are encouraged to bring a positive attitude, participate enthusiastically, and listen attentively to receive the full blessing from this worship time.

Breaks Instead of Recess

You will no longer need indoor and outdoor shoes. Students will only go outside during breaks if the weather is nice. Middle School students have a 10-minute morning break, a 30-minute lunch break, and a 5-minute afternoon break.

Classrooms & Lockers

You will be moving from room to room for your classes. You will also be assigned a locker of your own. Lockers are not locked, although if you wish to rent a combination lock for your locker, you may contact the office for details. We trust you to respect your classmates and stay out of each other's lockers. We also expect you to keep your lockers tidy and in good condition. For a full description of our locker policy, please refer to the Student Handbook.

Clothes for P.E.

You will be expected to change into your P.E. uniform for P.E. class and back into your school clothes at the end of class. This includes one of the two Central P.E. t-shirts that will be given to you, a pair of your own athletic shorts, and athletic shoes. You are given a 1-point "Preparedness" grade for each P.E. class period, and failure to wear any of these 3 items will give you a "0" for that category that day. During fair weather seasons, we often go outside, so wear athletic shoes that you are okay with wearing outside. Bare or socked feet are not allowed. Do not wear Crocs, Dudes, sandals, slides, boots, etc., as these are not athletic wear for P.E. You will be able to change clothes in the MS locker rooms in the MS/Elementary gym or in the bathrooms located just outside of this gym.

Library

Middle school students no longer have Library as a separate class. Study halls will either be hosted in a teacher's classroom or the MS/HS library. Students may have the option to visit the library during a study hall, if given permission by their study hall teacher. Students are expected to maintain a quiet, studious atmosphere when using the library. Books may be checked out for two weeks at a time.

COMMUNICATION & TECHNOLOGY

FACTS and Google Classroom

You will no longer be receiving regular lesson plan emails from your teachers. Lesson plans and homework can be found in FACTS. You can also download the app for quick and easy access to all your child's information. See Appendix A for details.

Central utilizes the Google platform for communication and file organization. Students will use Google Drive and Gmail to access information and communicate with their teachers. See Appendix B for more details.

Chromebooks

You will be assigned a Chromebook for use during the school day. They may not be taken home. We expect you to take good care of your Chromebook and to use it responsibly. There will be consequences for dropping, losing, or misusing your Chromebook. All teachers in the building can see exactly what tabs you have open and can assign demerits for 'misuse.'

Examples of 'misuse:'

- Any Google search, Youtube video, online game, or Pinterest search that is non-educational and/or not used for homework.
- Using your Chromebook during break without specific teacher permission.
- Email is only to be quickly checked for communication with teachers. Usage outside of educational purposes is not allowed.

Cell Phone Technology

Cell phone usage (including iPods and non-school-issued iPads) is prohibited during school hours. We want you to fully engage in your learning and present with your classmates and teachers! Phones should be turned off and kept in lockers for the entire school day. Students may use the phones in front offices if they need to connect with a parent. Students who violate this policy will have their phones confiscated. Please see the Student Handbook for full policy details.

Smartwatches will be allowed, so long as they are not used for anything other than a time-keeping device (e.g. scrolling, speaking into, or tapping). Clocks are present throughout the school and students have the ability to communicate with parents through the office phone.

ATTENDANCE & HOMEWORK

Attendance

Attendance is an important part of the educational process, as students are more likely to succeed in their academics when they are in class. Instructional time in the classroom allows the teacher to build each student's skills and knowledge in each subject. We recognize that absences will happen but want to stress the importance of regular class attendance for the success of our students.

Students will be allowed no more than 10 absences in a class per semester (5 absences for classes that do not meet on a daily basis). Absences due to school-sponsored extracurricular activities do not apply. A medical waiver may be requested for excessive absences caused by a specific medical concern.

Students who exceed the 10 (or 5) absences per semester must appeal to the Superintendent for consideration of the circumstances before they are allowed to continue in the class for credit. The Superintendent may forgo an appeal meeting based on a medical waiver or extenuating circumstances (death in the family, weather delayed travel, etc.)

Students who exceed more than 10 absences will be ineligible for extracurricular activities for a period of 1 week or 2 contests whichever is greater.

Regardless of a medical waiver, at least 50% of the assignments must be completed each quarter for the student to receive credit for the course; that is, if less than 50% of the assignments are turned in, the student will be not eligible to pass the course.

Homework & Missed Work

Students are responsible for keeping track of their homework. Teachers have homework and tests listed in the "Homework" section of FACTS.

- When a few class periods within one day are missed: Students should check with FACTS, friends, or teachers to get their missed work.
- When one whole school day is missed: Students and parents should check FACTS for links, lessons and homework assignments. Students will be responsible to collect missed work when they return to school and get caught up.
- Planned extended absence planned due to vacation or medical reasons: Students or parents should let the teachers know at least a week in advance. Depending on the curriculum, we will give the students some of the work they will miss. While students are gone, we will collect the rest and he or she should make it up after returning. We cannot give all homework in advance because our lesson plans change daily depending on how fast or slow the students work, and whether or not we need to add an extra lesson to help them understand.

GRADING & GPA

Grading

Each middle school teacher may weigh tests, homework, and projects differently. When you look in the "Gradebook" section of FACTS, you will see how these categories are weighted in that subject. If you have any concerns about grades at any time of the school year, please do not hesitate to email any of the teachers!

- Missing: "M" means a student didn't hand in an assignment on time. We encourage both parents and students to regularly check for missing assignments, or to sign up for automatic alerts in FACTS. Students should email the teacher directly for help in figuring out what is missing.
- Absent: "A" means the assignment was not turned in on time because the student was absent.
- Zero: "0" means a student receives a 0 on the assignment.
- Pending: "P" means the assignment has been handed in, but not yet graded.
- Excused: "X" means the assignment is being excused by the teacher.

Grading System

Middle School teachers use the GPA grading scale below. GPA is calculated by the semester. The percent/letter grade averaging scale equivalents are:

BEHAVIORAL EXPECTATIONS

Appearance Code

Central seeks to maintain a positive and professional learning environment, and we desire for our students to dress in a way that encourages concentrated study and doesn't distract from the learning process. As students enter Middle School, we expect a higher level of maturity and encourage students to dress in a way that reflects modesty and purity.

Some notable expectations:

- Shorts (including biker shorts), skirts and dresses require at least fingertip length when arms are placed naturally at one's side.
- Leggings may be worn if the length of the top covers the buttock and groin area.
- Jeans should not have holes that show skin above mid thigh (dress/skirt length).
- All clothing should not be constructed in an overall style that is too tight or body-shape revealing.
- Clothing should completely cover undergarments, including straps, at all times (including while sitting or bending over). Girls should take care to ensure tops are not plunging or revealing at the neckline.
- Tank tops with a strap less than 3-fingers or 2 inches wide are not acceptable school attire.
- Students should take care to wear modest clothing styles that consistently cover their midsections at all times.

Students will be asked to change into suitable clothing if they are found to be in deviation of these expectations. If students are not able to correct the violation, alternative clothing will be provided.

Please take time to read through the full Appearance Code policy in our Student Handbook for clarification. We strive to apply these standards consistently and appreciate your support and cooperation.

Demerits & Detentions

We value the spiritual growth and discipleship of all our students and desire to see them model their character after Christ. Behavior that doesn't align with our values, whether at school or on the bus, may result in a demerit. If misbehavior doesn't stop after a verbal warning from the teacher, the student will be counseled on correct behavior and the teacher will assign and record the demerit in FACTS. Two demerits will result in a detention and will re-set at the semester. For a full explanation of our disciplinary policies, please see our Student Handbook.

Cheating & Plagiarism

As middle school students advance to higher levels of research and writing, we expect them to use their God-given talents and to put forth their best efforts. Cheating, including plagiarism, is not acceptable. Students who are caught cheating or plagiarizing or helping another student to do so will face consequences. Please refer to the Student Handbook for policy details.

INVOLVEMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Chapel Praise Team

Students who enjoy using their gifts of music and have a desire to help lead worship are invited to participate in Chapel Praise Teams. Contact Mr. De Groot if you're interested.

Extra-Curriculars & Transportation

Middle School students will have the opportunity to participate in extra-curricular activities (see Student Handbook for a full list of activities). 7th and 8th graders are eligible to participate in Varsity and JV competition. 6th graders may participate only if:

- The team has separate coaches, practices, and events from high school teams.
- Additional players are needed to complete a roster.
- Coaches have the capacity to manage more athletes.
- The practice space can accommodate more students.

All Middle School students (including 6th grade) who intend to participate in athletics for the first time will need to complete a sports physical (per MSHSL guidelines) and submit their medical forms by the first day of practice. Please visit centralbluejays.org/resources to access the forms and refer to the Student Handbook for a full description of our athletic policies.

Central does not provide busing to middle school athletic events. Our coaches and admin staff will work together to communicate with you and request parent volunteers to drive to the away events.

FIELD TRIPS & EVENTS

Middle School students will have the opportunity to participate in numerous field trips and events throughout the school year. When additional participation fees 💰, chaperones 👤, or supplies 🍴 are requested, the teachers will communicate with parents to cover those items.

6th-8th Middle School Retreat (September) 💰 👤 🍴

Although it's not a school-sponsored activity, each year in September our Middle School students have the opportunity to attend a 2-day, parent-led Spiritual Retreat in the local area. Parents are invited to join for the closing worship session.

Middle School Lock-In (assessed on a year-to-year basis; typically October) 👤 🍴

This fun evening of games, snacks, and activities provides Middle School students a chance to socialize and connect with each other outside of school.

6th-7th Grade Camp Encounter (May of alternating years) 💰 👤 🍴

Our 6th & 7th graders have the opportunity to attend Camp Encounter at the Prairie Woods Environmental Learning Center near Spicer, MN. This learning experience provides the students with hands-on activities beyond the typical classroom environment.

5th-8th Grade Powder Ridge Skiing & Snow Boarding Trip (January/February) 💰 👤

All middle school students will have an opportunity to ski or snowboard at Powder Ridge Resort located in Kimball, MN as part of our Physical Education program.

6th-8th Grade Track & Field Day (April) 👤

All middle school students will compete at this one-day track & field event hosted by Central at MACCRAY.

6th-8th Grade Trip to Birch Coulee (May)

Middle school students will get a day to enjoy nature and a campfire meal near the end of the school year.

6th-12th Grade Awards Day (May)

Middle school and high school students gather with staff and community members to celebrate their hard work and achievements over the year.

BIRTHDAYS & HOLIDAY PARTIES

Birthdays

We love to celebrate birthdays and joyous occasions! Students are welcome to bring birthday treats, but it is not required. If you bring treats, please have enough for either your whole squad or all students in your grade level. Treats will be handed out during squad time or study hall.

*Please check with school before sending treats to see if there are any students with food allergies.

As always, we ask that if students plan to host parties that not all classmates will be invited to, that they extend those invitations outside of school. This will help to avoid hurt feelings and awkward situations.

Holiday Parties

Room parents are not assigned at the Middle School level. However, we may ask for some parent volunteers who can be called on to occasionally provide snacks and help with activity planning throughout the year. The Middle School Student Council will also play a role in planning for these fun activities - including Spirit Week and holiday parties.

Why should Middle School parents and students be checking FACTS?



GRADEBOOK: check this section for grades on tests, projects, and assignments. An M" indicates a missing assignment. If you can't figure out what assignment you are missing, email your teacher for help.

HOMEWORK: find your homework assignments here, particularly for days when you have missed school, or when you are planning to miss days. This takes the place of elementary school Learning Plans.

ANNOUNCEMENTS, LUNCH MENUS, REPORT CARDS, SCHEDULES, and other helpful information can also be found in FACTS.

Students and parents can see all of these categories in the **FACTS** website and the **FACTS** app!

App: Go to your app store and search Central MN Christian School.

- You will need the school code: **CM-MN**.
- Parents should login with their family login information; students who have personal handheld devices can also get the app and sign in with their student login information.

Website: Students, we will help you login the first week of school on your Chromebooks, and encourage you to regularly check FACTS during your study hall periods.
