A few years ago, I had a detention with students who had taken something from another student's locker without permission. During our conversation, I shared a story about buying my house in Sioux Center, where the previous owners didn't even have keys to give me at closing. They had lived there for 20 years without ever using a lock!

I asked the students to reflect on why the owners didn't feel the need to lock their doors and why we don't use padlocks on our lockers at school. Together, we discussed what makes a place safe or unsafe, ultimately deciding that it boils down to the trust we have in our community.

This reminded me of an article I read in Harvard Business Review that found the happiest places to live are often those where people know and are known by their neighbors. God's design, once again affirmed by science, shows that our well-being thrives on strong communal connections. When reliable individuals act with integrity and build meaningful relationships, they create a shared sense of trust and security.

Personal Responsibility + Communal Commitment = Trusting Community

Philippians 3:18-20 reminds us:

"For, as I have often told you before and now tell you again even with tears, many live as enemies of the cross of Christ. Their destiny is destruction, their god is their stomach, and their glory is in their shame. Their mind is set on earthly things. But our citizenship is in heaven. And we eagerly await a Savior from there, the Lord Jesus Christ..."

As we "eagerly await" our Savior this Advent season, may we remember our status as heavenly citizens. Creating safe spaces involves more than locking doors or minding our own business—it means embodying the gift of Jesus in how we live, love, and connect with others. As you gather with family, feast, and exchange gifts, don't forget to be a good neighbor and bring a little bit of heaven to the places where you live.














COMING SOON! FISHING CLUB






Count It All Joy

Our first Quarter of the year, August-October, was certainly challenging as we felt the pain of being short-staffed and the blessing of an extraordinary amount of donations. Since vehicles came in 3-4 at a time, several times a day. By our estimate, our actual donations are double what was recorded because we failed to keep up. We have all felt the strain and stress. As I consider my report to you, I'm in awe of God leading me to the book of James.

In James, faithful followers of Jesus are challenged to not just "talk the talk," but to "walk the walk." While our faith walk requires a growth of knowledge about the Word, James exhorts us to not stop there. He focuses on the truths of Jesus' words in the Sermon on the Mount and motivates us to act upon what He taught.

James puts to rest the idea that one can become a Christian and yet continue living in sin, exhibiting no fruit of righteousness. Such a "faith," James declares, is shared by the demons who "believe and tremble" (James 2:19). While Paul's teachings concentrate on our justification with God, James' teachings concentrate on the works that exemplify that justification. James was writing to Jews to encourage them to continue growing in this new Christian faith. James emphasizes that good actions will naturally flow from those who are filled with the Spirit and questions whether someone may or may not have a saving faith if the fruits of the Spirit cannot be seen. Good works are not the cause of salvation, but they are the result of it.

James presents the ultimate description of the relationship between faith and works – or rather, living out our faith – demonstrating what we say is true, IS true. James addresses perseverance, wisdom, and active obedience to God's Word. Faith grows through trials when approached with joy and trust in God. "Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing." (James 1:2-4) Thank you, Jesus, for the opportunity to grow in you.
