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WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO TEACH CHRISTIANLY?

Dean and I have almost completed our teacher intent meetings for the year. These conversations are filled with highs and lows about the best and worst parts of “doing” Christian school. One of the tools we employ is a self-assessment rubric for teachers to reflect on how they are living out the mission, vision, and values of the organization. And we have some pretty hard graders in our midst!

One of the categories is the integration of Teaching for Transformation. Many teachers gave themselves a low score in this category, feeling that there is always more they could do. I genuinely appreciate that they identify room for growth and see gaps where they could integrate Tft more effectively. Many of them comment on how they have trouble remembering to use the right “language”. However, Dean and I always shake our heads and muse: “Do they not see what we see?”

When it comes to the intersection of faith and learning, Teaching for Transformation is designed to tie the work of the classroom to the living story of God and discover Truth in His world. The goal isn’t to use the correct label or put the right sticker on the wall (although we may do that to demonstrate), but rather to discover and celebrate God’s intentional purpose and design as revealed throughout His world. Our teachers do that, not only by employing effective teaching strategies, but by spending time with the designer.

Treasury Agency Training suggests that by mastering the intricate details, texture, and security features of genuine currency, counterfeits become immediately obvious by comparison. Similarly, as our teachers equip our students to walk with Christ and engage His world through various disciplines, they will be able to spot falsehood. Social confusion happens for kids when their inherited values run into conflict with real-life situations. Teaching for Transformation shows us how to better navigate what we say we believe with real-life experiences and opportunities.

Christian teaching at Central is not about perfection, but about presence; about walking with the designer, modeling a life of truth, and faithfully leading our students on their journey of discovery.

ELEMENTARY UPDATE:

In elementary chapels and small groups, we kicked off 2026 by focusing on Bible reading and memorization. We heard from two fantastic speakers this month. Lenae Bulthuis kicked off our month, reminding kids that even adults have trouble focusing on God’s word sometimes, and that we can ask God to help us focus when we are reading (see if your child remembers what pray & pull means). She introduced our theme verse for the month, Psalm 1:1,2, which reminds us to meditate on God’s word. David Zigterman reminded us that memorizing God’s word is not always easy, but it is so worth it. He talked about olive presses and how much work it is for farmers to squeeze and press the olives, but the oil that comes out is worth all the work. Similarly, when we work to memorize God’s word and press it into our hearts, the fruits that come from that will be worth it. In small groups this month, we read several different verses discussing the importance of reading God’s word and hiding it in our hearts. We finished up the month with a Flock day focused on sharing favorite Bible verses. It was encouraging to see our older and younger students spending some time talking about their favorite verses and competing in Bible trivia!

MIDDLE AND HIGH SCHOOL UPDATE:

The middle and high schools experienced a quiet, though effective month. With no chapel during the week of Winterim, I was excited to launch into the second half of our school year by speaking at our first chapel of 2026 on January 16th. I was privileged to set the tone of the new year with a spirit of encouragement to the student body, faculty, and staff. They were challenged to set healthy goals, including benchmarks along the way, to be used as mile markers for self-reflection, correction, and celebration. In addition, they were reminded that when objectives are neglected to be met, this does not always indicate failure, or the sole result of defeat, but rather an opportunity for accountability and a recalibration of initiative. Each day brings a new beginning to start afresh with chasing our dreams, and one step closer to achieving them. Paul writes ... “Brothers and Sisters, I do not consider myself yet to have taken hold of it. But one thing I do: Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus.” (Philippians 3:13-14)

Likewise, as mentioned above, our students were thrilled to join in the collaborative efforts of both ends of the building by engaging in another Flock day. The primary emphasis was on each student identifying their ‘favorite Bible verse,’ which then accompanied games and activities surrounding these verses. The concentrated theme stressed the importance of knowing what is in the Bible and becoming familiar enough with it that it starts to resonate within each of us.



Family:

Bud, married to Janet Koning (Class of 1973). We are part of a five-generation Central family, beginning with my grandfather John, who was in the first 1st grade class in 1911. Three of our children also married Central alumni.

What year did you graduate from Central?

1972

What is your favorite hobby?

Motorcycling (I've ridden in most U.S. states and eight countries) and playing softball two to three times a week.

What is one fun fact about you that most people wouldn't guess?

Three of my police cases gained national attention, including an armored car heist featured on Unsolved Mysteries, a weekend-long hostage situation covered by Paul Harvey and The Arsenio Hall Show, and a high-profile arrest case that was ultimately upheld in court.

Where has life taken you since graduation, and what did you study or major in college?

After graduating from Central, I attended Calvin College before transferring to Ferris State University, where I earned a B.S. in Criminal Justice. I spent 15 years as a police officer and 3 years as a firefighter, primarily in Burnsville, MN. Later, we moved back to Willmar so our children could attend Central, and I started a business providing labor crews to the poultry industry. In 2000, we moved to Cap Haitian, Haiti, where we helped establish an infant care ministry, Children of the Promise, caring for infants and widows, that continues today. At that time, I had stage 4 cancer, and we stepped down and handed it over to a couple of other alumni. We've also lived in Michigan, South Dakota, Florida, and now Hendersonville, North Carolina, where we own an Inn with my son, Travis, and wife, Becky. A few months ago, I officially retired, hopefully for good, and enjoy traveling, family, and staying active.

What are some of your favorite memories from your time at Central?

I was involved in nearly every extracurricular activity available. One favorite memory is the "Turkey Trot" intramural race, where Faith Wubben famously ran in a dress and beat several boys on the cross-country team!

How did your experience at Central shape who you are today?

Central helped ground my values, encouraged involvement, and fostered lifelong relationships that shaped both my faith and leadership.

What makes you proud to be an alumni of Central?

Seeing how Central has grown, especially the new campus, and watching the quality of students continue to thrive. I love hearing graduates reflect on retreats and mission trips as highlights of their experience.


What advice would you give to current students about preparing for life after graduation?

C. Congratulations to Sienna Duinick on making history and becoming the school's all-time leading scorer with 2,170 career points and counting.



Did you know Kodak was the first with digital technology? They never introduced it because they "sold too much film." Blockbuster's leadership refused to entertain the idea of streaming rentals because they made 10% of their revenue from late fees. Sears, among others, was reluctant to try online sales. Lego was going out of business before the founder's grandson suggested they try movies.

Author Simon Sinek talks about the infinite [v. finite] game. Among other details, the infinite game has no end; the finite game has a beginning and an end, a winner and a loser. The infinite mindset/player expects surprises and pivots, not only thinking in terms of [financial] quarters but in generations. In other words, the infinite mindset/player believes in something bigger than themselves and pursues ideas beyond today's crisis management because the future depends on it.
