Students will be known personally, discipled intentionally, and challenged academically.


Our Values:

In 2024, Central introduced the Profile of a Central Graduate, a framework built around our Teaching for Transformation Throughlines—discipleship habits that invite students to see and live out their learning as part of God's story.

To help seniors reflect on these habits in a meaningful and personal way, Central launched a new Bible 12 Capstone course last spring. The course encouraged students to look back on their years at Central and consider how their faith has shaped their learning, relationships, and sense of purpose.

Throughout the semester, seniors created a Faith Formation Portfolio, a collection of essays and photos capturing their growth—academically, spiritually, and personally—during their time at Central.

The experience culminated in May with a Capstone Presentation to family, friends, and members of the Central community. Each student explored the vocation they plan to pursue after graduation, interviewing a professional in that field and reflecting on how they might live as engaged citizens in God's kingdom through that work. Presentations were shared before a panel of local business professionals, with scholarships awarded in several categories including medical, business, agriculture, and public/law.

"Personally, the capstone project was a defining moment for me during my senior year, further proving my passion for my future. It helped me tie together my abilities to think independently and critically, and to make sure that my faith remains central when choosing my future career path," said 2025 graduate, Naomi Asake.




STUDENT VOLUNTEER HOURS

New This Year-

This year, we are excited to pilot our new Student Volunteer Program—an opportunity for our high school students to live out one of the core parts of our mission: a life of service. The program encourages students to take an active role in our school community while learning the values of service, responsibility, and teamwork.

Much like our Parent Volunteer Hours, students are now asked to give a set number of hours in service to the school. Already this year, we have seen students step up in wonderful ways—helping with landscaping projects, providing office support, running concert live streams, and serving in the concession stands.

In addition to the new Student Volunteer Program, we are committed to providing meaningful service opportunities for students throughout the year. One of our favorite traditions is Leaf Raking Day, when our high school students spend a morning serving local residents by raking leaves across the community.

We also organize an all-school giving project, bringing students of every age together to make a difference beyond our walls. Last year, students collected donations, made tie blankets, and assembled dry soup mixes for Family Promise of Kandiyohi County, a ministry that supports individuals and families experiencing homelessness in our area. The second grade class had the opportunity to deliver the goods to the organization as a reward for collecting the most donations.

These experiences not only bless those we serve but also shape our students' hearts for lifelong service.

TEST SCORES COMPARISON

At Central, academic excellence is more than a goal—it is part of our vision to help each student grow in knowledge and faith. One way we see growth in action is through standardized testing. In 2025, our elementary students scored 16–51% higher than their peers in area public schools. These results show that Central students are not just meeting expectations—they are exceeding local benchmarks in both reading and math.

But these numbers tell only part of the story. Behind every score is a classroom where teachers challenge students to think critically, families who encourage learning at home, and students who dive into their studies with curiosity and determination.

Together, this partnership brings Central's Christ-centered approach to life, helping students reach their full God-given potential—both in the classroom and beyond.

When reviewing proficiency rates, a few differences to note between the assessments used at Central and those used in area public schools are:

Central Students take the lowa Assessments (formerly known as the lowa Test of Basic Skills) - a nationally recognized norm-referenced test used by many Christian Schools across the country. The lowa Assessments also align well with most state standards nationwide. When we talk about proficiency, assessments that are norm-referenced (how a student compares to the other students taking the same test), most states, including lowa, use a National Percentile Rank (NPR) of 41% or higher as the proficiency cut line to determine students "on or above grade level." For example, if a school has a 75% proficiency rate, it means that three-quarters of the school ranked at or above 41% nationally.

Area public schools administer the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments (MCAs), which are criterion-referenced assessments that are aligned with Minnesota State Standards, and determine proficiency at a fixed performance level based on the students meeting the standards.

Even with different testing systems, Central's performance stands out: our students are mastering key concepts and achieving at levels that far exceed local benchmarks.

Wonderfully Made: Exploring God's Design Through Science

Why did you choose to take Anatomy/Physiology this year?

That is the question posed by Mrs. Bulthuis to 31 juniors and seniors who elected to take this challenging, non-required science course. Their answers varied—from exploring future medical careers, to wanting to tackle a tough subject, to simply gaining knowledge that could one day help them care well for others.

For these students, Anatomy and Physiology is a real challenge. It stretches students to study information in great depth, recall prior learning, and wrestle with moral and ethical questions about life, disease, and death.

For Mrs. Bulthuis, her deep hope is that the students in her classroom see the good design of our Creator in the way the body works, that they have the opportunity to process the way in which the Fall and sin have affected the human body, and that they are equipped to join in bringing restoration where bodily disease has real impact on people made in the image of God.

To help bring the classroom to life, the class partners with a local healthcare system and medical professionals. This fall, they visited the Chippewa County Montevideo Health Facility to tour their Radiology Department. Students learned about imaging technologies—X-ray, MRI, CT, and more—along with education paths and job opportunities.

A special highlight of the visit was students witnessed a live 2D and 3D Sonogram of Mrs. Bulthuis and her husband's unborn son.

Ultimately, as a science teacher, it is Mrs. Bulthuis' prayer that these students leave the class prepared to serve and inspired to show compassion to God's fearfully and wonderfully made people, in utero and at every stage of life.



Serving Beyond the Volleyball Court

It was a fun season watching the Lady Bluejays. From their push into the playoffs and a thrilling win over MACCRAY to earn the Camden North Conference title to receiving numerous conference honors, the season was full of memorable highlights. But for this team, the scoreboard only tells part of the story. Their greatest victories this year came not just in how they played, but in how they served the community.

Guided by Central's Coaching for Transformation framework, the volleyball program continues to focus on more than athletic skill. Coaches are intentionally shaping student-athletes who compete with purpose, unity, and Christ-like character. Practices and games have become places where discipleship happens—where trust is built, where leadership grows, and where glorifying God matters more than a win.

That heart for service showed up in several ways this season. In honor of Breast Cancer Awareness Month, the team hosted their annual Serving Up a Cure night, selling bundt cakes to raise money for the Willmar Cancer Center. The girls raised an incredible \$3,161, supporting the center's wig shop, Blessing Bags for new patients, and the Cancer Support Fund that helps families facing financial hardship during treatment.

The team also found smaller, heartfelt ways to serve others. Before each match, captains Emmi Braem and Maddy Vander Ark shared boxes of homemade cookies with opposing captains—a simple act that turned pre-game competition into a moment of kindness and connection.

And for senior Reece Duinick, this season carried extra meaning. Inspired by her younger brother Henry, the team joined in supporting Jack's Basket, a Minnesota-based nonprofit that globally celebrates babies with Down syndrome. With the help of a generous donor, every "pancake" (a diving save) on the court meant another contribution to the cause. Their efforts didn't stop there—the team also plans to visit Jack's Basket to learn more about their mission and help pack baskets for families.

As the season has come to a close, the Lady Bluejays' record reflects their hard work—but the deeper impact is measured in the ways they have used volleyball as a platform for faith, gratitude, and service. Through practice, games, and outreach efforts, they are discovering what it means to compete for something greater than themselves—and to serve others with the same energy and joy they bring to the court.
