## BEING TRANSFORMED

Did you know that New Year's Resolutions date back more than 4,000 years(1) and include practices of acts of kindness and repaying debts? Most resolutions today include physical health goals or reducing stress. Many historical figures, including Jonathan Edwards, Benjamin Franklin, and John Wesley, were known to set and review their goals (resolutions and covenants) at the start of each year.

According to a simple Google search, today in the U.S., only about 30-40% of people make New Year's resolutions, and of those, only 8-10% of people keep them with any lasting impact. That means only 2-4% of the population keep New Year's Day resolutions. Good for them. But do their goals and choices affect you and me?

Well, in America, 2-4% is between 6.7 and 13.4 million people: the size of Indiana (2%) or Illinois (4%). Put another way, it is the entire construction work force, or all school teachers and nurses combined!

The U.S. spends around \$4.5 trillion annually on health care, so if 2-4% of the population became substantially healthier, it would result in tens of billions of dollars saved each year and diverted to other economic initiatives. These achieved resolutions also come with many attractive intangibles like increased energy, lower levels of stress, and self-confidence that come from reaching set goals.

Like the seasons, life contains many rhythms. We practice daily habits like brushing our teeth, participate in weekly cycles of corporate worship, monthly board meetings, and yearly holiday celebrations. It makes sense to set aside a little time to set and evaluate goals with some regularity. New Year's Day seems as good a time as any.

At Central, we are Being Transformed; *We value whole-person growth and practice continuous improvement through learning, personal reflection, and Christian development. We are open to new ideas and seek God's kingdom dream for our lives and the world.* (Rom 12:2; II Cor 5:17; Ps 51:10)

Maybe you're not a New Year's Resolution person, and that's ok. But how is God calling you to grow? A repaired relationship? A renewed sense of stewardship over your body or finances? Everyone faithfully doing a little will move the needle a lot.

we moved to Kenya after Patrick was hired by Samaritan's Purse to fly their







# Central Counselor's Corner

## College and Military Visits

Central welcomed representatives from various institutions this fall. These visits provided students with valuable insights into future opportunities in higher education and military service:

## University of Northwestern Campus Visit (pictured)

As part of our partnership with the University of Northwestern - St. Paul, our juniors participated in a special campus visit on September 17. This meaningful experience gave students a firsthand look at college life. They began the day attending chapel alongside current college students, followed by a guided campus tour. Students also enjoyed lunch in the main dining center and concluded their visit with an admissions presentation, where they learned more about academic programs, campus life, and scholarship opportunities.



## Financial Aid / FAFSA Informational Meeting

Central hosted a Financial Aid Information Session for juniors and seniors and their parents on September 22. Harlan Harmelink, Director of Financial Aid at Dordt University, provided a helpful overview of the financial aid process, explained the FAFSA, and answered questions during a Q&A session.

## PreACT Testing Day

Students participated in Testing Day on October 10. Eighth and ninth grade students completed the PreACT 8/9, while tenth grade students took the PreACT. These assessments help students identify strengths, areas for growth, and future academic planning needs.

## College Timeline Presentation

On October 16, the junior class participated in a college timeline presentation focused on the college application process. Key topics included when to apply, application requirements, transcripts, financial information, scholarships, and other important planning details.

## Renville-Sibley's Scholar of the Month Program

Central is proud to participate in the Renville-Sibley Scholar of the Month Program. During the months of November through February, teachers from local school districts nominate one high school senior from their school. From the pool of nominees, two students are randomly selected to receive a \$100 donation made to their school in their honor. The chosen student gets to decide which school program, such as music, athletics, or the arts, will benefit from the donation. In April, a banquet will be held to recognize all the students selected throughout the year and their families. At the event, one of the honorees will be randomly chosen to receive a \$1,000 scholarship from Renville-Sibley.


