Last week, I spent a full day shadowing our 8th-grade class, from 2nd through 8th period, and it was a joy to see the day through their eyes. I was impressed by how kind, hardworking, and good-natured they were. They were comfortable with me in the room, and what I saw felt like a normal day at Central: real learning, real energy, and real community.

In Social Studies, I was thrilled to see students diving into the U.S. Constitution, an essential for every student to understand. In English, a substitute teacher stepped in and kept things moving smoothly, even adding a few helpful touches of her own. Science class was full of great discussion and review games for a test, and I loved that Mrs. Brouwer took time to read aloud to her students after lunch. Many were caught up in the story and groaned when the alarm bell went off to move on to the next subject! (Parents - you can STILL read to your kids! :)

The afternoon brought music, and our middle schoolers did not disappoint. Choir began with a spontaneous warm-up exercise (without being told!), and the band closed the day with Mr. Veenstra directing a lot of energy.

What stood out most was the balance and comfort; students were challenged but supported, technology was used appropriately (and sparsely), and there was plenty of hands-on learning. If someone asked what it's like to be an 8th grader at Central, I'd say this: We are living out our mission it's busy, it's real, it's meaningful, and it's a community where faith and learning come together in a quality, Christ-centered education.

#### Where has life taken you since graduation?

One month after graduating from Central, I reported to the United States Naval Academy (USNA) for seven weeks of basic training. I then began a 4-year curriculum designed to train naval officers, including academic coursework, extracurricular activities, military evolutions, and professional development seminars. During summers in between, I participated in several cybersecurity internships and spent a month in Bahrain in 2023 working with unmanned assets (drones). I graduated from USNA and was commissioned as an Ensign in the U.S. Navy this past May.

#### What is your career or current focus?

Harkening back to my Bahrain experience, I am now the Assistant Operations Officer at Unmanned Surface Vessel (USV) Squadron Three, leading a division of sailors and working towards a qualification in USVs. In about a year from now, I will be forward-deploying to Sasebo, Japan. for a three-year tour aboard USS SAN DIEGO (LPD 22), where I will obtain my Surface Warfare Officer (SWO) qualification.

#### What are some of your favorite memories from your time at Central?


I loved going on retreats in the fall. I got to spend quality time with my closest friends outdoors and dig deeper into my relationship with God. We had some fantastic speakers, and I still follow two of them to this day.

#### How did your experience at Central shape who you are today?

What set Central apart from nearly every other school my peers came from was the Christian education it provided me with. I found myself in many situations where my friends would question why I was so optimistic all the time or why I never swore, and those questions often led to conversations about God. Even though these people I talked to didn't necessarily accept Jesus right then and there, I will forever be grateful for being a part of the process, and Central helped equip me for that. I hope to have many more of those talks in the future. Additionally, I served in an extracurricular activity called Officers' Christian Fellowship (OCF) and had the privilege of being nominated president during my last year at USNA. In being granted this opportunity, my Christian background allowed me to positively impact countless young believers, some of them brand new.

#### What is your favorite hobby?

I love to visit museums and zoos. I have always enjoyed studying animals and extinct species, specifically those native to the Pleistocene Epoch (Ice Age). I'm considering returning to that course of study once I've finished my naval career.

What advice would you give to current students about preparing for life after graduation?

There's plenty I could say about preparing for college, but I know not every graduate of Central will go the same route I did, so I will say this: Take ownership of your faith. No matter where you go, you will find yourself surrounded by those who need to hear the Gospel, and you need to be prepared to express what you believe as well as stand by it. That doesn't mean just knowing the facts about the Bible, because every graduate of Central leaves with that knowledge. What it does mean is being intentional about spending time in your relationship with Jesus and knowing your faith in your heart as well as in your mind. If you're moving away, get plugged into a church. Pray often, read your Bible, and establish a group of strong believers who will hold you accountable. This is more important now than it's ever been.

What is one fun fact about you that most people wouldn't guess?

The first time I ever went ice skating was not in Minnesota. It was in the Dubai Mall in the middle of July; they have an indoor rink!

### What makes you proud to be an alumni of Central?

I'm proud of Central's dedication to providing students with a Christian environment at school. Someone from my organization had to interview a few faculty members at Central for a summer internship I was taking, and I heard that they were very impressed with the hospitality they were met with, as well as the curriculum being taught. I was certainly proud of where I came from at that moment.
