### REINFORCING OUR CULTURE THROUGH PARENT COMMITMENTS

I anticipate some chatter as we roll out the new Student Volunteer Hours initiative this fall. I've been reflecting on a principle I hold that has shaped me as both a parent and a school leader: I don't like it when we place expectations on kids that we, as adults, are unwilling to do ourselves. This really bothered me in 2020 when I saw schools mandating excessive COVID-19 restrictions on kids.

At Central Minnesota Christian School, we talk a lot about culture, that set of values, beliefs, and shared norms that unspokenly govern "the way we do things around here." For better or worse, cultures are not neutral and will change over time. The question is whether it will drift by accident or grow by intention?

Bluejay Nation is a covenantal community. That means at least one caregiver in every family professes faith in Christ and has committed to partnering with us in shaping students spiritually, academically, and personally. Our vision, mission, and values reflect that partnership and are rooted in scripture. But let's be honest: values hung on a wall don't build a culture; behavior does.

One of our core values is Building Trust. Trust flourishes when expectations are clear and followed faithfully. It weakens when we lose sight of the commitments. That's why our Parent Commitment is more than just paperwork you sign during enrollment; it's part of what makes this community thrive.

This partnership begins spiritually. Families agree to align with us in teaching a Biblical worldview and living out their faith, demonstrating practices like praying together, reading scripture, and serving others. We require active engagement in a local church, believing that we are Christ's witnesses in the world.

Parents also support learning at home, demonstrating lifelong learning, talking and reading with their kids, and supporting their teachers by maintaining open communication. Each family agrees to honor their tuition commitments, communicating with school leadership if hardships arise.

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And finally, it manifests in our mission of service. That means volunteering, showing up, and stepping forward when there's a need. Our School Volunteer Program isn't about filling slots on a spreadsheet or even saving money; it's about creating a family atmosphere where our students see adults living out the values we teach. These aren't just policies; they are the lifeblood of sustainable Christian education.

I'm reminded of the church usher who once said, "We have nothing but kind Christians in our church... until you try to seat someone else in their pew." Culture can quickly slide toward self-interest if we aren't careful. But when we actively nurture the right things like trust, service, generosity, and faith, we reinforce the culture we say we value.

As we approach another school year, thank you for being partners who don't just cheer from the sidelines but are on the field with us. Together, we are shaping a community where our children see the gospel lived out...by us. Let's steward Bluejay Nation for God's glory, one commitment at a time.


Mugs are available for purchase at the High School office and are \$25 each.



## TEST SCORE RESULTS

At Central Minnesota Christian School, we value providing a nurturing and challenging environment where every child is Known Personally, Discipled Intentionally, and Challenged Academically. Year after year, our students exceed national academic averages, often performing one or two grade levels ahead of their peers. We believe in equipping children not only with academic excellence but with a strong foundation rooted in a Biblical worldview. Through our Teaching for Transformation framework, our teachers thoughtfully integrate God's word into every subject so that students may experience His story through meaningful lessons that engage both their minds and hearts.

Results indicate what level students are testing at in each grade using the Iowa Assessments. Student results include English Language Arts (ELA), Math, & a Composite Score consisting of ELA, Math, Science, and Social Studies. For example: 4th grade students, on a 4th grade level test, tested as if they were a student in the eighth month of 5th grade.

# DEEPER LEARNING DAYS

Block Scheduling. Modified Block. Deeper Learning Days. We've been using this language with high school parents for a month now, but what does it all mean, and why are we exploring it at Central? A Deeper Learning Day (block schedule) is a different way to structure a school day compared to the traditional period model. In the period model that we currently use, there are 8 periods per day of roughly 40-minute classes. Block scheduling, on the other hand, is structured in a way that offers fewer classes in a day, but for a longer amount of time (80-90 minutes). There are several reasons why schools consider block scheduling. The primary reason schools adopt a block schedule is to allow for extended class periods, enabling teachers to explore lesson content in greater depth and offer students more meaningful learning experiences, including labs, collaborative group work, and project-based activities.

As a Teaching for Transformation school, our Deep Hope is for students to have Formational Learning Experiences, build Habits of Learning, and discover how God's word connects to His world that we are actively stewarding. To implement instructional strategies and assignments that align with this vision, we are exploring what a restructured school day would look like here. With more time, our teachers will be able to provide more student-centered instruction, which is why we are piloting Deeper Learning Days on Wednesdays to see its impact on instructional practices and student work to help us live out our Deep Hope for Students at Central.

## **SOCCER FIELD UPDATES**

Over the past few seasons, our soccer field has presented ongoing challenges with water usage and grass maintenance, making it difficult to balance quality play with responsible stewardship of resources. After a thorough assessment by an independent turf specialist—facilitated by Duininck—we now have a sustainable path forward. Their analysis confirmed the field's soil structure is excellent, but the existing Kentucky bluegrass required more water and fertilizer than our school and city could sustainably support. In collaboration with city leaders and with generous support from Duininck, including donated time and resources, we "rebooted" the field this summer. This included re-seeding with a resilient tall fescue blend, installing soil moisture sensors for smarter watering, and providing turf care at no cost to the school for at least two years. These improvements will ensure the field is more environmentally responsible, fiscally

sound, and ready for play this fall.

Additionally, this fall, a new scoreboard will be installed in the southwest corner of the field. Its purchase was included in the same fundraising campaign that provided the high school scoreboards a few years ago; installation was simply delayed until now. While electrical work still needs to be completed, we anticipate it will be ready for the start of the soccer season.

We're grateful for our community partners who make updates like these possible, benefiting both our students and the wider community. We look forward to enjoying the new season ahead!



## **NEW! STUDENT VOLUNTEER HOURS**

This year, we will be implementing a new, student volunteer program. Similar to our parent-volunteer program, high school students will now serve in a variety of capacities. The program is designed to immerse our high school students in the heart of our mission—living a life of service. It offers a meaningful opportunity to instill core values such as service, responsibility, and community involvement.

As we pilot the program this year, each student in 9<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> grade will be required to serve 4 hours over the course of the year. Volunteer opportunities include concessions, Harvest Festival, helping with live streams, Freedom Fun Days, and more.

We are thankful for parents and a school community that live out the values we strive to teach our students, and now provide them with tangible opportunities to actively get involved. As they step into new opportunities to serve this year, we hope you'll join us in affirming their efforts. ## PARENT SURVEY RESULTS

This spring, 110 parents completed our annual Parent Feedback Survey. We're grateful to those who took the time to share their thoughts. Your input is a vital part of how we evaluate our family's experiences at Central—and how we plan for the future.

This year's survey focused on three key areas: use of technology in the classroom, homework load, and tuition. The responses provided both affirmation and valuable direction.

Overall, we were thrilled to hear that families are having a positive experience at school and feel we are holding to our core mission and values. A few positive takeaways include:

- Almost 90% of parents rated Academic Excellence, Spiritual Formation, and "Known Personally" as 4 or 5 on a 5-point scale.
- Parents consistently celebrated our Christ-centered community and the care of our teachers.
- Families expressed joy in meaningful friendships and students being challenged academically and discipled intentionally.

Alongside this positive feedback, families also shared honest concerns regarding tuition and long-term affordability. Key takeaways include:

- While most support modest tuition increases to preserve programs, nearly 40% support holding tuition flat while considering cuts to programming.
- Families also shared their concerns about long-term affordability.

This feedback is not only heard, it's being acted upon. Both school leadership and the school board have reviewed the results, and several steps are already underway:

- 1. Tuition Task Force: A group of parents is being convened to serve on a Tuition Task Force. This team will review our current tuition model and explore potential opportunities.
- 2. Financial Sustainability Plan: The school board has approved and begun implementing a comprehensive, 5-year plan focused on enrollment growth, cost rationalization, and identifying new revenue sources. This plan is being actively carried out by the board, leadership team, and supporting committees.

Your feedback is being heard and taken seriously as we prayerfully make decisions that impact our students and families. Thank you to every parent who shared honestly with us. We are encouraged by your support and committed to growing thoughtfully together.
